

## JUSTICE FOR VICTIMS OF TOXIC GAS LEAK

COMMUNITIES OF BHOPAL INDIA









Thirty years ago, between 7,000 and 10,000 people died within three days of a toxic gas leak at a pesticide factory in Bhopal, central India. Many survivors still suffer serious long-term health problems due to the effects of gas exposure – particularly women. What's more, contamination from chemicals left at the abandoned factory site continues to a pose a serious health risk for the local community.

Activists Rampyari Bai and Safreen Khan know the full horror of the disaster. Rampyari's daughter-in-law was seven months pregnant on the night it happened. She suddenly went into labour as the leak hit the community, but she and her baby died soon afterwards in hospital. Rampyari herself has struggled with cancer.

Safreen's father has had serious heart problems, and her mother has difficulties with her eyesight. Safreen told us that many children in her community are born with disabilities and deformities. Local residents believe that the widespread health problems have been made worse because people have had to drink contaminated water.

Thirty years on, Rampyari, Safreen and the people of Bhopal are still seeking justice. Survivors of the gas leak have not received adequate compensation to cover the full extent of their injuries. Many have been driven deeper into poverty. The polluted factory site has not been cleaned up. And the companies involved have not been held to account.
